Happy Summer Pullman! Several façade restoration projects are already in full swing throughout the neighborhood, and we're looking forward to another great season of improvements in our community.

For anyone interested in restoring the façade of their historic home, our newly updated Homeowner Guide (available at www.pullmancivic.org/beman/homeownersGuide.pdf) is an excellent resource for the proper methods of treating historic properties in the neighborhood. Tuckpointing that adorns the beautiful face brick front of our homes is among many other important maintenance and repair measures commonly encountered by Pullman residents. Care must be taken when performing this type of work, as the face brick used on several of the buildings throughout Pullman is considerably softer than that typical of brick buildings. This "softer" material is more susceptible to damage that could harm both the appearance of the building and the soundness of the structure itself.

As the Homeowner Guide states: "Standard building permits regarding tuckpointing stipulate that "care should be taken not to damage the brick" when grinding out the joints. Grinding out brick along with old mortar results in an inappropriately wide mortar joint, which significantly and inappropriately alters the overall appearance of the building."

Mortar joints used in Pullman are particularly effective at shedding water and thus prolonging the life of the brick. Therefore, it is important to ensure that any tuckpointing work conform to the proper mortar and joint profile specifications. Further details are available in the Homeowner Guide.

Although October may seem more than just a season away, it's never too early to start preparing for the Annual Pullman House Tour. Each year, half the net proceeds from the house tour fund the Beman Committee's Façade Reimbursement Project, which has resulted in numerous façade restoration projects over the years. If you've been a recipient of a Façade Reimbursement, or are interested in applying for one, consider donating time this year, or even featuring your house on the tour, to make Pullman's annual showcase another great success.

Summer Crime Prevention Tips

With the onset of spring and the upcoming summer season, offenders use this time as an opportunity to commit confidence crimes and burglaries for financial gain. The Chicago Police Department is offering the following information to help safeguard against these crimes.

About These Crime

- Offenders attempt to gain entry into residences using scams such as offering to check water, and offering to clean gutters or rooftops.
- Upon gaining entry, the offenders may rummage through the residence.
- Offenders take cash and other valuables then flee.

About the Offender(s)

- Offenders wear clothing similar to real utility uniforms.
- Offenders are usually males who work in pairs or small groups.
- Offenders trade clothing and disguises in order to avoid being identified.

What You Can Do

- Be aware of this situation and alert your neighbors.
- If you have a security system in your residence, keep it maintained and
- If you have video surveillance in your home, keep it up to date. Also, know how to operate the device and how to retrieve images.
- Call 911 to report any suspicious activity in your neighborhood.
- Should you become the victim of a crime, preserve the area until police officers can process the scene for evidence.
- Keep exterior windows clear of obstructions such as shrubs and trees
- Attend your local CAPS Beat meetings to stay informed about crime in your area.

From the Dining Car: Homemade Baked Beans

Native Americans used to make baked beans with maple syrup and bear fat. I'm going to make it a little easier for you. Stay out of the woods and use the old standby, prepackaged bacon found in the safety of your friendly grocery store.

I've been promising myself that I was going to make baked beans from scratch and I finally did it, thanks to this great recipe, compliments of AHRhodes3 on Allrecipes.com. Craig loves this recipe and, since he's my official taste tester, it's going in the regular rotation of menus at Casa Champlain. The flavor really comes through once all of the ingredients get to know each other. Don't let the long baking time scare you off. The taste is worth the wait.

Ingredients

2 cups navy beans

1/2 pound bacon

1 onion, finely diced

3 tablespoons molasses

2 teaspoons salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/4 teaspoon dry mustard

1/2 cup ketchup

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup brown sugar

Directions

Soak the beans according to the instructions on the bag, either the quick soak or overnight. Drain and reserve the liquid. Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

Arrange beans in a 2 quart bean pot or casserole dish by layering the beans, bacon, and onion. (I sliced the bacon into bite-sized pieces) In a saucepan, combine molasses, salt, pepper, dry mustard, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, and brown sugar. Bring the mixture to a boil and pour over beans. Pour in just enough of the reserved bean water to cover the beans. Cover the dish with a lid or aluminum foil.

Bake for 3 to 4 hours in the preheated oven until the beans are tender. Remove the lid, about halfway through cooking, and add more liquid, if necessary, to prevent the beans from getting too dry.

In Praise of Verticality: The Uses of Vines and Climbers: Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

Vines can be both a pleasure and a pain. Most gardeners would see them as a pleasure: They provide green canopies which are often self-adhering. This is particularly nice if we prefer to see green over a brick wall. On the other hand, the same attributes which make them lovely also create maintenance. They climb or amble, therefore, they may be in need of cutting or curtailing.

Climbers fall into different categories depending on the way they climb. Self-adhering climbers, which climb by "adhesive pads" or aerial roots, would include: trumpet vine, Virginia Creeper (Parthenocissus quinquefolia), and climbing hydrangea. These require no tying in, but need strong supports as they often get heavy and climb high.

Climbers which require tying in would include: clematis, climbing roses and honeysuckle--the latter less in favor now as it can be invasive in some areas. Climbing roses and clematis tend to like at least five to six hours of direct sun at minimum, but there are roses and clematis which can handle partial shade. Both roses and clematis like to be well-watered in good draining soil.

Some examples of climbing roses which tolerate partial shade are: Henry Kelsey (a Canadian explorer rose which is very hardy, red and said to grow 12-20 feet); 'Dortmund' (a lipstick-red rose with a white center). The rose growing in our front yard is a Canadian Explorer Rose 'William Baffin' which is said to grow 8-12 feet but ours seems to grow higher. In a category by itself is Wisteria, a twining vine which needs very strong support and also needs full sun. When in a good location this vine is beautiful, fragrant, and can be a showpiece. However, full sun in Pullman being in short commodity, consider vines for both verticality and privacy, and we'll keep talking.

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
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
