Summer is in full swing in Pullman and we can expect to see several great restoration projects in process throughout the neighborhood!

One concern that many homeowners face regarding both the exterior and the interior of their homes is the presence of lead-based paint. The Beman Committee has recently compiled a Preservation Brief regarding lead-based paint that will be added to the Pullman Homeowner Guide (www.pullmancivic.org/beman/homeownersGuide.pdf), an excerpt from which reads as follows:

Lead compounds were an important component of paint used in the 18th, 19th and early 20th centuries. Lead-based paint was used extensively on wooden exteriors and interior trim work, window sashes, window frames, baseboards, doors, frames and metals. Since houses are periodically repainted, the most recent layer of paint will most likely not contain lead, but the older layers underneath probably will. Therefore, the only way to accurately determine the amount of lead present in older paint is to have it analyzed.

Hazards should be removed, mitigated, or managed in the order of their health threat, as identified in a risk assessment (with 1. the greatest risk and 8. the least dangerous):

- 1. Peeling, chipping, flaking, and chewed interior lead¬ based paint and surfaces
- 2. Lead dust on interior surfaces
- 3. High lead in soil levels around the house and in play areas
- 4. Deteriorated exterior painted surfaces and features
- 5. Friction surfaces subject to abrasion (windows, doors, painted floors)
- 6. Accessible, chewable surfaces (sills, rails) if small children are present
- 7. Impact surfaces (baseboards and door jambs)
- 8. Other interior surfaces showing age or deterioration (walls and ceilings)

Reducing and controlling lead hazards can be successfully accomplished without destroying the character-defining features and finishes of historic buildings. Methods that control lead hazards should be selected that minimize the impact to historic resources while ensuring that housing is lead-safe. It is also important in the Pullman neighborhood to never plant vegetables or herbs for human consumption in the ground. It is recommended to always practice container gardening given the high risk of lead in the soil.

From the Dining Car: Sadie's Fried Corn

My mom used to make fried corn for us every summer when the farm stands were bursting with newly picked ears and the cost was low. You can also make this recipe year round with canned corn, but nothing beats fresh!

SADIE'S FRIED CORN Ingredients 6 shucked ears of corn 2-3 slices of bacon 1/2 - 1 diced bell pepper (depending on size)

1 cup of water Salt and pepper

Cut kernels off the corncobs. In a heavy frying pan, cook bacon until crisp. Remove bacon, drain, crumble, and set aside. Fry bell pepper in bacon fat until just softened. Add corn and water. Cook at medium heat until tender. Stir occasionally, scraping the brown off the bottom of the pan, and blending with the corn and pepper. Add more water, if needed, a little at a time, to maintain moistness. Salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle crumbled bacon on top.

TIP OF THE MONTH

Do not overcook your sweet corn! Bring water to a boil before dropping in the ears. Let the water return to a boil and boil hard for 3 or 4 minutes. Serve immediately. To microwave shucked corn, slather them in butter and wrap tightly in plastic wrap. Microwave on full power for 2 minutes per ear. If your corn is too long to fit in the pot or microwave, simply snap them apart with your hands. Using a knife to cut them will crush the kernels.

Some Like It Hot: Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

In writing this, I am not referring to the 1959 classic movie with Marilyn Monroe, Tony Curtis, and Jack Lemmon, wonderful though that movie might be. Now that we are headed into the so called "dog days of summer," though the days are now getting shorter, I am calling your attention to some plants that actually like it hot, both perennial and annuals. Illinois being the "Prairie State" we naturally have numerous perennials which handle heat well, in particular with their tough root system. Plants in this category might include Rudbeckia, both tall and short varieties which constitute: Black Eyed Susans; Rattlesnake Master--interesting foliage, not flower as we know it; Queen of the Prairie, a large perennial with a pink plume; Baptista, in shades of blue and white--this can grow up to four feet tall; Ironweed, blue / purple flower; Butterfly Weed, or ascepias; Joe Pye Weed; Gayfeather-- the list goes on and on.

In a second category are plants that have adopted to a Mediterranean climate and can take intense sun. These include lavender, rosemary, nepeta, and many of the herbs. Finally we have plants which are bulbs or annuals which perform astoundingly well if, however, they receive a good watering on occasion in relentless heat. These plants include the following: Cannas, tall, with their trademark colorful plume and often colorful foliage. These are a bulb which must be dug up if you want to save it; zinnas, annual non-perennial geraniums, pelargoniums, actually; and last but not least, petunias. Petunias also smell wonderful on a summer night--the white and purple ones seem to have the most scent. And, we'll keep talking . . .

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
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
