These long hot days of summer seem like a good time to revisit a part of your house which is probably the subject of more marketing, aggressive promises of energy savings, and vendor financing. That part of your house is the windows and restoring originals or replacing with replications in the proper configuration is one of the most impactful restoration project that you can undertake.

It can be very tempting to succumb to the siren call of thermal pain insulated vinyl windows when you open a utility bill or face the prospect of scraping peeling paint. However, because of the Landmark Designation protecting the facades, we are unaware of ANY mass-manufactured windows which meet historic standards to be allowed to be installed on the protected facades of the houses. They can be installed in rear openings if desired.

What to do if you need to replace failing windows? First understand what is currently installed in your house, if they are original they are a precious resource made from old growth timber and the utmost should be done to salvage them. Often they can be removed, repaired and reinstalled with modern weather stripping for a similar or even lower cost than a new window.

Not sure if you have original windows, or you know you don't? Visit the Facade Legacy project; www.pullman-museum.org/facades/ and plug in your address, you will be able to pull up architectural drawings of the windows originally installed in your house. After that you can visit the Homeowners Guide for more information on windows and to locate contractor and vendors who have experience working in Pullman; www.pullmancivic.org/homeownersGuide.

As mentioned earlier, repairing originals or replacing with historically accurate replications in one of the most impactful improvements you can make to your house. This is because the architect used the windows as one of the primary elements to visually tie together the row house facades. Window repair or replacement with accurate replications is also the type of project which is eligible for the Facade Reimbursement Program.

Still determined to replace with a vendor financed modern window? In that case you will need to bring a physical sample of the window to Chicago Landmarks for their review and approval. Installing such a window on the front facade without an approval and a permit is a building code violation and opens you up to significant liability and eventually being forced to remove them and replace with correct windows.

Some Like It Hot: Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

Some perennials shrug off the heat, as we might want to do if we were in plant form. Most of these plants have either made adoptions in their area of origin (think prairie plants, Mediterranean plants, or plants that have been hybridized to withstand the heat – like petunias). Often they have deeper root systems to withstand drought (ie grasses such as Karl Forester, or Little Bluestem) and sometimes they are silver colored to again withstand the heat – think lamb's ears, artmesia, and Russian Sage. Other plants that we call natives have been developing over hundreds of years to adapt to the climate in the Chicago area – many of these are prairie plants with names like "Queen of the Prairie," "Rudbeckia" (black eyed Susan), Echinea (Cone flower), and Achilla, or Yarrow, to mention a few. All of these plants will hold up well to heat and drier conditions.

Other hot weather stand outs include Salvia, Sedums (they store the water in their leaves), Yucca, Nepeta, Butterfly Weed and Arkansas Blue Star, or Amsonia, the latter being a less than common plant that it is in no way commonplace, with showy yellow foliage in fall and bright green foliage in Spring.

All these, and more, will do well in your Pullman Summer garden! Just remember to water more deeply in the morning, not so much at night, which will encourage fungal diseases- -and with most of the above plants, be sure that they get good drainage. And we'll keep talking . . .

Pullman Artspace Lofts project update: The result of a mandatory federal review process,

triggered by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, and based on letters from nearly 40 historic preservation and other consulting agencies, the City's Department of Fleet and Facility Management's (2FM) "Section 106 Summary of Decision" concludes that the construction of artist housing on the empty lot on the 111th block of Langley, vacant since the 1930s, will have "no adverse effect." In addition, the City's determination was recently affirmed by the correspondence from the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), an independent federal agency which is tasked with reviewing these types of projects. 
