Solon Says...A Report of the PCO Beman Committee: Revisiting Preservation and Restoration Standards John Christie & Wyatt Ollestad, Email: pcobemancommittee@gmail.com

Given the amount of incorrect information regarding the historic preservation standards that exist and how they apply to our historic community, it seems a good time to provide a brief primer for both new and longtime residents.

The foundation and gold standard for historic preservation are the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties. The Standards are a series of concepts about maintaining, repairing, and replacing historic materials, as well as designing new additions or making alterations. The Guidelines offer general design and technical recommendations to assist in applying the Standards to a specific property. Together, they provide a framework and guidance for decision-making about work or changes to a historic property. The guidelines are in depth and links are provided below, should you care to learn more. At a high level, these standards call for the preservation and restoration of existing original features. If such features cannot be restored due to condition or are missing entirely they should be replaced with features that are of the same material and design as the original based on an in-depth analysis of the property.

The Chicago Landmarks Ordinance is based on these standards, but interpreted with an eye towards providing homeowners with a degree of flexibility and affordability. In turn the Landmarks ordinance is applied differently across all of the city's Landmark Districts, based on their unique features. In Pullman the landmark standards apply only the portions of the house that is visible from the public way meaning, for most properties, just the front facade. For additions/changes which impact the roofline of a property, such an addition must not be visible from the sidewalk across the street from the property.

Chicago also recognizes the potential added financial burden of replicating original materials so they make allowances in the name of affordability. For example, slate was used on the majority of roofs originally, Landmarks has determined acceptable replacement materials to be slate, synthetic slate, or architectural asphalt shingles.

In other areas because of both the importance of the feature to the historic integrity of the façade and a lack of acceptable modern replacements, Landmarks will require in-kind replacement.

Windows are a prime example of this. They are a key design feature of both the individual houses and a unifying element to each row of houses and set the design rhythm for each block. The originals have extremely narrow mutton bars, much narrower then modern replacement windows. These factors mean there are no acceptable 'cheap' windows for use in the front facades of Pullman houses. Landmarks will review any window system a homeowner proposes, but to date has only approved one alternative window system which is a custom designed thermal pane system and has been installed in a number of Pullman houses. Important to note these are not 'cheap' replacement windows, these are purpose designed to fit Pullman requirements and achieve greater energy savings.

Considering Garden Structures: Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

While our yards in Pullman are typically small, I have been impressed with the creative use of structures to both optimize and beautify living spaces. For example, pergolas, arbors, small conservatories/ cold frames, glasshouses and arches can be used to complement Pullman gardens.

A pergola, that is a structure which is either rustic or more refined, extending out from a wall as a semi enclosed space, joins the house with the surrounding outdoors. People can plant vines on top, such as wisteria, ivy or grapes, but others leave it fairly open, preferring to notice the patterns of light for those sitting under it. Some people hang a creative light fixture from a pergola, over for example a back porch or deck.

Arches can be effective in creating a focus for the garden and – in our confined spaces, drawing the eye upward. The use of verticality, a common element in many of these features is an effective strategy in enlarging our sense of space, in much the same way that our high ceilings in Pullman houses add to a sense of graciousness.

Raised beds, another garden structure, have both a practical and aesthetic value. By lifting the planting surface off the ground, shade is reduced. Beds are also then more accessible and the soil is more easily modified.

Small does not need to mean boring. Some of the most creatively interesting gardens I have seen are relatively small...and we'll keep talking...



From the Dining Car: Trick or Treat, Here Is Something Good to Eat! Patty Lawson

Kids will love this very "Halloweeny" recipe; the filling oozes out and looks like blood! It is also very easy to make, so let them have a hand in making this holiday treat.

BLEEDING CUPCAKES - Ingredients:

- 1 egg
- 8 oz. softened cream cheese
- 1/3 cup of sugar
- Red food coloring
- 6 oz. chocolate chips
- 1 box cake mix (any flavor)

Preheat oven per the cake mix directions and line muffin tins with cupcake liners. (Halloween-themed would be nice!) Beat the egg in a medium bowl, add the softened cream cheese, and beat until smooth. Add the sugar and beat until smooth. Add the red food coloring, making it several shades darker than desired, as the color will lighten as it bakes. Fold in the chocolate chips. Prepare the cake batter according to the box instructions and fill the cups 2/3 full with the batter. Put about 1 ½ teaspoonfuls of the filling in the center of each cupcake. Bake, cool, and frost as desired.

TIP OF THE MONTH:

To extend the life of your jack o' lantern, after cleaning the pulp out of the pumpkin and carving your design, soak the pumpkin a couple of hours in a solution of 1 teaspoon of bleach to one gallon of water. Dry thoroughly, and then rub inside and out, and along all cut edges, with vegetable oil or petroleum jelly to prevent shriveling. If you are going to light your jack o'lantern with a candle, sprinkle the bottom side of the pumpkin lid with cinnamon, nutmeg, or cloves so your pumpkin will do double duty as an air freshener.



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
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
