Solon Says...A Report of the PCO Beman Committee: Frequently Asked Questions

Q: I see lots of vinyl windows, steel security doors and other non-historic façade features throughout Pullman – why can't I do the same?

A: Most of the non-historic features you see in Pullman were installed prior to the neighborhood being designated as a city landmark in 1972. From time to time, some homeowners break the law and install non-historic elements. However, these homeowners are subject to court action by the Chicago Building Department.

Q: My neighbor across the street just put in new historic windows. I like them and want the same for my house. Is that OK?

A: Not necessarily. What's right for your neighbor's house may not be right for yours. Solon S. Beman, Pullman's architect, used dozens of different façade elements in more than a hundred different combinations. So, rather than rely on what your neighbor did, check your façade online at http://www.pullmanmuseum.org/facades/ or contact the Beman Committee to find out what façade elements are original to your particular house.

Q: Since tuckpointing is just regular maintenance, why do I need a permit?

A: Although tuckpointing is, strictly speaking, a maintenance issue, using the wrong mortar can cause significant, irreversible damage to bricks, and mortar joints have a dramatic impact on the look of a Pullman façade. For these reasons, the Commission on Chicago Landmarks must review and approve all façade tuckpointing projects to ensure that the mortar matches the original in both composition and color. For more information about tuckpointing, see Pullman Preservation Brief #2 in the Homeowners Guide.

Q: I'm thinking about making some changes to the front of my historic house – what should I do first?

A: The first thing you should do is contact the Beman Committee and/or the Commission on Chicago Landmarks to ensure that proposed changes comply with accepted preservation standards and city ordinances. Making such a call can save you lots of time and money in the long run by helping you to do your project right the first time.

Q: Replacing façade features with approved historic replications is sometimes more expensive than non-historic equivalents. What if I can't afford them?

A: The Beman Committee launched the Façade Reimbursement Program specifically for this reason – in many instances, \$1,000 goes a long way toward bridging the gap between historic and non-historic replacement features. In certain instances – namely doors and mansard roofs – the Commission on Chicago Landmarks allows homeowners to install less-expensive features that emulate rather than replicate original features. As a last resort, there is an economic hardship clause in the Chicago Landmarks ordinance to help qualifying homeowners avoid "the loss of all reasonable and beneficial use of or return from the property."

Q: How can I apply for the Façade Reimbursement Program?

A: Applications for projects are made available starting in January of each year, projects are selected during the March PCO meeting. Contact the Beman Committee if you have questions about a potential project.

Garden Quotes: Winter Window Boxes Lynn Smith

Europeans, especially those in northern Europe, know the value of window boxes. From older brick, wood and stone covered houses you see them: ivy peaking on the edges, often with Geraniums and other annuals peeking out of them. Americans have also gotten more accustomed to these, but what you still see less often in America is winter window boxes. Perhaps, they too are beginning to catch on however, because there is as much to recommend a winter as a summer window box and they are less difficult to care for . What window boxes display is a view of green from both the street and the house that provides a bit of the outdoor to connect the house with the outdoors, and more specifically your yard. From a Pullman House a holiday window box is beautiful from the inside, where one can use evergreens, sprays of holly, ornaments, Magnolia leaves, pine cones, Dogwood and curly Willow branches to further connect with nature and the Season. From the outside it dresses up the house and does not need watering.

When making winter window boxes it is important to have sufficient dirt in the boxes to firmly anchor the natural items that you might want to place in your window box. There is also the possibility, if you have enough dirt, to additionally plant some bulbs under the winter items, for the upcoming Spring. Now if you're going to make these while enjoying your favorite holiday aperitif, do so under adultish supervision and stay away from open flames. And don't chew and drive!

PA-RUM-PA-PA-PUM BALLS

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup dark chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup milk chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 3 tablespoons corn syrup
- 3 cups vanilla wafers, crushed into crumbs
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup rum (dark or light)

INSTRUCTIONS

In a heavy pot, melt chocolate over low heat. Remove from heat and stir in corn syrup and powdered sugar.

Beat in vanilla wafers. Stir in salt, vanilla extract, and rum until combined. Refrigerate mixture until firm.

Roll mixture into one-inch balls. Roll in the coatings of your choice, like sprinkles, cocoa, or sugar.


