Pullman Cares through Environmental Recycling Lynne Collins and Susan Schoephoester



A change has also been made to selection criteria – any homeowner who has had their property on the House Tour within the last five years and applies for a valid project will be automatically selected.



Arches and Pergolas and Climbers--Oh My! Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

You could see gardening as a recreation of play in the out of doors, and you would not be that far off. In keeping with this idea, the use of arches and pergolas in an outdoor space recreates some of the mystery and fun that children often feel in a fort or a tunnel of green. Arches and pergolas, which could be seen as a series of arches, with upper cross timbers supporting plant growth on a larger scale, also called Arbors, bring needed vertical space for climbers such as clematis and roses and create an illusion of more space by counter intuitively dividing the space.

During the Medieval and Renaissance periods, arches were often made with live plants such as dogwood or willow upon which other plants were trained to flower. Though we could do this as well today, it is more customary to have arches made of wood, brick, stone, or metal. Very nice rustic arches are not difficult to make. An important consideration is to make the arch or pergola of sufficient height to make it comfortable to walk or stand under, while also keeping in mind the growth habits of the plants. Wisteria, for example will always need a very strong structure as would trumpet vine; an arbor or arch for clematis would be less heavy.

Attractive vines for arches and pergolas or arbors might include clematis, roses, honeysuckle, and wisteria. Creating an arching feature in your Pullman garden is absolutely worth considering for the use of vertical space and the illusion of more space that it can contribute . . . and we'll keep talking...



From the Dining Car: When Life Hands You Lemonades Patty Lawson

Make lemon bars! I've never made lemon bars until this month.

Never. I do make a killer icebox lemon cake and a lemon meringue pie that would make Aunt Bee proud, but never those little tartly sweet bars that pop up at every pot luck and bake sale. So I searched my cookbooks and favorite online recipe sites, came up with a mishmash of a couple of lemony concoctions and invented a Patty-made, Craigapproved version of an all-time favorite.

INGREDIENTS

1 cup of butter (2 sticks), softened

1/2 cup white sugar

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 lemons, juiced, or ½ cup bottled lemon juice

4 eggs

1 1/2 cups white sugar

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

Powdered sugar for dusting (optional)

Preheat oven to 350°.

In a medium bowl, mix together butter, 2 cups of flour, and ½ cup of sugar. Press into the bottom of an ungreased 9x13 pan. Bake for 15-20 minutes, or until firm and golden.

In another bowl, whisk together remaining 1 % cups of sugar and % cup of flour. Beat in the 4 eggs and lemon juice and pour over the baked crust.

Bake for another 20 minutes. The bars will firm up as they cool. Dust with powdered sugar (optional) and cut into 2-inch squares.


