

## Solon Says: Taking Stock in Pullman Restoration 2019

As the weather cools down and winds down the building season each year, we in the Beman Committee do an informal assessment of the state of preservation in Pullman, balancing the number of historically accurate restoration projects against the number of projects which ignored the landmarks ordinance and frankly harmed the protected facades. This year, similar to the last 3-4 years, we're happy to say we continue to see a positive trend of proper restoration projects far out numbering incorrect work. You will hear and see more of these great projects in this space and when we recognize them at a future PCO meeting.

However, as we celebrate the good, we have to recognize the bad. We have seen a spike in work done without permits and without regard to proper restoration techniques. The cumulative impact of these projects extends far beyond a façade with improper windows, the mansard roof with three-tab shingles, or the terrible tuckpointing job which has damaged an entire façade.

The cumulative impact of such projects tends to be lasting and has a corrosive effect on restoration efforts in the district. Neighbors see the work and no visible consequences and may decide they can do it too, or wonder why they are being held to a higher standard than their neighbors. The homeowners who knowingly or unknowingly had the work done will at some point find themselves in building court answering for permit and landmark violations and quite possibly being made to undo the improper work. The architectural integrity of the district is just that much further weakened.

These unfortunate situations serve as a reminder that we, as homeowners, are ultimately responsible for work done and need to follow some common sense guidelines; living in a historic district means the majority of work undertaken on the front facades of our houses requires a city permit and Landmarks approval Regardless of material, stock or semi-custom windows and doors aren't appropriate for the district and typically will not be approved by Landmarks Big box home centers or large window distributors can extend credit, but can't provide the custom work needed to meet landmark standards Chicago Landmarks is not inflexible, they will work with you and your contractor to find an acceptable, cost effective solution for your project; for instance, they will approve a 5-panel wooden entrance door in lieu of a custom made historically accurate copy of the original door.

The specialized vendors listed in the Homeowners Guide can provide you with the proper windows or doors at a price which is extremely competitive and, in many cases, cheaper than those sold by large commercial contractors Always get multiple prices/bids for any project, make sure your contractor obtains the necessary permits. The permitting process is not just a fundraising system for the city, but exists to make sure the work you're paying for is done correctly, to code and to landmark standards.

A quick Beman Committee meeting note – our November and December meetings are falling the day before or on the holidays this year, so we will hold a meeting the first Wednesday of December.

## Pullman Partners: Positioning Pullman

It is hard to believe that just four years ago Chicago was a major city without a National Park.Pullman changed that thanksto neighborhood residentswho for decades preserved itshistory and protected the community character.

Six months after President Obama designated this neighborhood as a national monument, hundreds of people came together for Positioning Pullman, a unique "ideas workshop" that combined local voices with architects and engineers from across the city.

Through this collaboration, a blueprintwas created for how the monument could bring Pullman's history to life for national park visitors, improve infrastructure for residents and visitors alike, and have tangible benefits for surrounding neighborhoods.

Community members offered their ideas in the four key areas; historic preservation, the national park experience, access – roads, transit and infrastructure, and economic impact and community development.

This ground-breaking, community-driven plan won sevenstate and national awards for excellence and is well on the way to completion! This fall many of the voices who outlined the Positioning Pullman blueprint came together to take stock of what has been accomplished and update priorities for the future.

There is certainly much to celebrate! Fifty-six million dollars has been invested within the monument boundary since 2015 and more than half of the 33 priority projects outlined in Positioning Pullman have been completed or are underway.

Some of the significant accomplishments include:

- More than \$34 million of public and private funds was raised to renovate the Pullman Administration and Factory building and grounds;
- The grounds are designed to be a welcoming "front yard" to Pullman National Monument;
- The 111thStreet station now offers hourly Metra service the Metra station was rebuilt.Recently Metra announced plans to make 111th Street stationfully accessible;
- There are new bike lanes on Cottage Grove Ave., the#4 CTA bus route was extended from downtown to 115th and the city will soon begin a redesign of 111thStreet that includes a mid-block pedestrian crossing.

Coming together to update Positioning Pullman provided an opportunity to outline this notable progress and check on what new project opportunities have arisen. For example, all in attendance agreed that renovating historic structures such as Greenstone Church, Market Hall and the Firehouse are critical to save the buildings for the future.

#### Green Spaces and Places: Falling for Ferns Lynn Smith

Ferns, those plants which are accurately called both primitive and evolutionary survivors, have existed for about 400 million years. They are primitive in the sense that they predated flowering plants, but not primitive in their flexibility and toughness in today's modern gardens. Their only downfall, perhaps, is their tendency to spread easily by underground rhizomes, necessitating dividing them every so often to be given to other interested gardeners.

I will note several types that are particularly pretty or easy to care for, as well as one fern which is more adapted to alkaline soils. Alkaline is the type of soil that we have more often in the Chicago and Pullman area.

The Maidenhair fern (Adiantum Pedatum) prefers partial to deep shade and is one of the ferns that is shorter. It is a distinctively lighter medium green, with almost a pocket like appearance in the middle and is hardy to zone 3. There are few problems with pests, but it does not multiply as quickly as Ostrich ferns, and generally takes up less space. It also adapts better to alkaline soil. Wood fern (Dryopteris), or male fern, will become tall, and do best in rich, humus-like soils that have good drainage. They will tolerate sun, if kept moist; can grow up to five feet tall; and grow well in partial to full shade.

Ostrich fern, also called Matteuccia, is one of the most commonly planted ferns. It grows as high as 4-6 feet, but it is not considered a good fern for alkaline soil. However, we do see them in Pullman--so they have adapted.

Other ferns worth considering are Osmunda, Holly or Christmas fern (Polystichum), the Lady Fern and the painted fern (Athyrium ).... And we'll keep talking....


