
2019 Candelight Tour Cindy McMahon

The application period for the 2020 Façade Reimbursement Program is approaching. Completed application will be due March 1st. Qualified projects will be announced or selected by drawing (in the case of more demand than supply) at the March PCO meeting.

How does a project qualify? The property must be an original contributing Pullman structure, the project must encompass the protected front façade and involve restoration of existing original material or replacement of missing elements with historically accurate replacement elements appropriate to your particular façade type. You must own the property; you DO NOT have to be an active member of the Civic Organization or the Historic Pullman Foundation. You have to have filled a volunteer shift on the 2019 House Tour.

If you had your house on House Tour in the past 5 years, your qualified project will automatically be accepted.

Physical copies of the 2020 guidelines and applications will be available at 645 E 111th. Digital files will be available for download from the PCO website.

Green Spaces and Places: Bamboo, A Somtimes Taboo Plant Lynn Smith

There is a reason that gardeners are wary of bamboo. It has a reputation for steadily taking over gardens. Indeed, many non – clumping, "running "bamboos should be avoided.

However, there is one variety of bamboo, called, "Fagesia" (of which there are several varieties, among them nitida, growing up to eight feet, F. robusta, Pingwu, "green screen, "growing to ten feet, and F. Demudata, growing to 10-15 feet), that could be considered. These bamboos are native to the forests of China where they evolved on the sides of mountains, interspersed with rhododendron and hydrangea, along with mahonia.

So, while exercising caution with bamboos is always a good idea, there are some varieties of bamboo that are winter hardy in Pullman and could be considered for an accent plant or screening – provided that you recognize that even clumping bamboo will need to be cut back. Also these plants can grow relatively quickly and need to be kept watered well. They will grow in sun to part shade. Like grasses they are normally cut back in late winter.

5th District Police Department Suggestions Things You Can Do To Help Protect Your Car From Theft

- 1. Don't Leave Your Car Unlocked, or Running Especially While It Is Unattended
- 2. Do Not Leave A Spare Key Near Your Vehicle Many people keep a spare key under the car, just in case they get locked out and thieves know exactly where to check for an extra key. While getting locked out of your car is a pain, think about the potential hassle of your car getting stolen.
- 3. Never Leave Your Windows Open Even during the summer when it is scorching hot, don't leave your windows open or slightly cracked when you are not in the vehicle.
- 4. Park In Well-Lit, Public Areas Avoid parking in areas that are poorly lit or places that are not immediately seen by the public. This will not only keep you safe when you exit the car, it will also help keep your car safe because thieves tend to avoid areas that are highly visible.
- 5. Install An Audible Alarm System And A Visible Anti-Theft Device Car thieves tend to avoid cars with alarms or anti-theft devices because they attract attention when they go off. These devices are well worth the investment.
- 6. Install A Vehicle Immobilizer System Thieves can bypass your ignition by "hotwiring" your car. You can prevent this by using a vehicle mobilizer system such as fuel cut-offs and smart keys.
- 7. Consider Installing A GPS Tracking System When your car is stolen, this tracking system will emit a signal to the police of your vehicle's location. This may help the police recover your vehicle faster and may minimize the damage to your car. This may be a good investment if you live in an area with high auto theft rates.
- 8. Don't Leave Valuable Personal Property In Your Car The best way to attract a thief is to leave your purse or another high-value item in a highly visible area of your car. If you must put something of value in your car, keep it in the trunk or under the seats, where it is not visible to others.

 9. Be Alert If you are wary of the safety of your car or see someone loitering around the parking lot, it's best to park somewhere else. It's better to walk a few extra steps than to have your car stolen because you ignored your


If your car is stolen, it is recommended that you give the following information to the police:

- The year, make, model and color of the car and the license plate number
- Approximate time the car was stolen
- Description of anyone you saw loitering around your car before it was stolen
- Description of suspect who stole your vehicle ex. Tattoos, bright color shoes, certain hairstyle, height, anything that may stand out about the subject
- Names of witnesses

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
