Pullman’s First Film Appearance

Pullman has been the filming location of a number of motion pictures and television episodes over the past century. Such movies as The Package, The Untouchables, and The Road to Perdition were all filmed in the neighborhood; The Polar Express used Pullman architecture as an inspiration. The first film made in Pullman was partly shot on the Pullman Factory grounds in 1918. According to the company magazine The Pullman Car Works Standard (June, 1918, v. 3, n.2; p. 13), “Pullman is soon to be featured on the screen in a stirring moving picture drama, called ‘Awake, America! Awake!’. Early in the month several moving picture men, of the Diamond Film Company, took a number of pictures in and about Pullman in which car building operations are shown and several Pullman men were induced to pose as ‘local color.’”





The film, a 6-reel epic (a long feature length film for the time), was intended as a patriotic appeal for pulling together to fight the forces of anarchy, Bolshevism, and oppression by disgruntled workers, aimed, of course, at what were seen as sympathizers and fellow travelers with wartime enemy Germany. The Chicago Board of Censors cut rioting and mob scenes from the finished print in August, 1918.

Despite these edits, the film was seized by the Justice Department because it supposedly violated provisions of the draconian Sedition Act of 1918. As far as I can tell, it had a very brief run (a month) before being confiscated. I have only found one poster of it being presented, shown at the Coloma Theatre in Coloma, MI, on September 19, 1918.

The New Orleans studio, Diamond Film Company, had an interesting history in and of itself, consisting of graft, mysterious oil and gas futures, and swindled investors. The studio space is now a local landmark in New Orleans.

Achieving the listing means "inclusion in a nationwide system of comparable sites, programs, and facilities that fosters networking and coordinating educational, preservation and commemorative activities" for the site which is located nearby, in the Altgeld Gardens/Riverdale neighborhood of Chicago.

The Jan & Aagje Ton Farm joins another Chicago Southland site, the Crete Congregational Church and adjoining Cemetery, as nearby verified locations associated with the Underground Railroad accepted for the NPS "Network to Freedom" registry. Both sites have been thoroughly researched and applications submitted (and accepted) by Professor Larry McClellan of the Little Calumet River Underground Railroad Project.



Other Speakers Include:

Diane Banta: recently retired from the NPS, and one of the founders and advisers of the Little Calumet River Underground Railroad Project.

Glennette Tilly Turner: noted author on the Underground Railroad in Illinois.

Professor Larry McClellan: historian, author, and principal researcher of the site(s).

Ronald Gaines: owner of Chicago's Finest Marina, and landowner of the property where the Jan & Aagje Ton Farm was located.

Deanda Johnson (or an NPS designate): National Director, NPS Network to Freedom.

To compliment this important designation, tours, educational programs, and events are being developed that will showcase these sites that are now part of the National Park Service's departments. This event is open to the public, and community members, historical and heritage societies, public officials, notable African American historical groups and societies, and a variety of media/press have been invited.

From the Dining Car: Soup and Salad Days

I wasn’t sure whether to write another summer recipe column or head straight into autumn fare. So, depending on the temperature when you receive this month’s “Pullman Flyer”, I’ve got all the bases covered. The potato soup recipe came courtesy of a grad school friend of mine. I totally forgot her name, but always held on to the recipe! The potato salad is my own and I’ve never attempted to put it on paper, I usually just “eyeball it”, adding and tasting as I go along. You do the same and put your special spin on it.

Tater Soup

3 cups red potatoes, peeled and cubed, 2 cups water, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped carrots, 1/4cup chopped onion, 1 tsp. Italian seasoning, 1/2 tsp. salt, Pepper to taste, Garlic powder to taste {I add garlic to almost every dish. Love the stuff!}, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 tbsp. all-purpose flour

In a large saucepan or Dutch oven, combine potatoes, water, celery, carrots, onion, and seasonings. Stir well, cover, and simmer until vegetables are tender (15-20 minutes). Add milk to flour and whisk until well blended. Add milk mixture to vegetables and cook until thickened. This should make 6-8 servings.

Tater Salad

1-2 lbs. red potatoes, 4-5 hard-boiled eggs, 1 onion, diced (your choice of size and variety), 1/2 cup diced celery, 1/2 cup green pepper, 1/2 cup mayonnaise 3-4 tbsp. yellow mustard, Sliced green olives (optional)

Dice and boil potatoes in cold water, with or without the skin, your choice. (I like to save time by boiling potatoes and eggs together.) Once tender, remove from heat and cool under cold water. (This also stops the cooking process.) Dice eggs into medium chunks. Combine potatoes, eggs and remaining ingredients in a bowl. Add salt, pepper, paprika, and garlic powder to taste. Serve cold.

TIP OF THE MONTH

Keep a can of WD-40 in your kitchen cabinet. It is good for oven burns or any other type of burn. It takes the burned feeling away and heals with no scarring. The basic ingredient in WD-40 is fish oil.

Green Spaces and Places: A Tree to Remember
The Native Sassafras Tree

Root Beer, which has waned in popularity more recently, was originally made from the Sassafras Tree. All parts of the tree are aromatic, with the tree sporting dark blue fruit, with deeply textured bark and yellow flowers in Spring. To my mind one of the prettiest characteristics of it is the fall color that the leaves display shades of yellow, orange, red, and sometimes pink in mitten like leaves which seem to have been drawn by a child’s hand. It is fast growing and long lived. It likes good drainage, growing well in sandier soils.

This tree can live as long as 500 years and typically will not live less than 100 years. It’s fat rich fruits are appreciated by as many as 23 species of birds, among them the Redheaded Wood pecker, American Robin, Northern Flicker, and the gray catbird. It grows in zones 4-9.

So, if you are looking for a Native bush and tree which has four season interest and supports the local birds, look no further than the old fashioned Sassafras Tree, and we’ll keep talking...

Animal Welfare in Pullman

Pullman is a uniquely situated community surrounded by large areas with limited access to animal welfare resources, and most of us have found a lost or dumped dog or cat, or seen some feral cats running around; most of us consistently for as long as we have all lived here. Many of these animals are found to be unsterilized, unvaccinated, and not microchipped. We also have issues with local residents putting cats out, letting dogs loose, or leaving animals behind. Many people reading this article are very much wanting to know about resources for their pets, and what to do about free-roaming cats they see around Pullman. Loose dogs: call 311 and ask for Animal Control.

60628 is a “target zip code” for the PAWS Chicago Lurie Family Spay/Neuter Clinic at 3516 W. 26th St. in South Lawndale, providing Pullman animals with heavily discounted basic services including spay/neuter and vaccinations.

Feral, free-roaming cats have legal status in Cook County, and should be left alone if they are sporting an “eartip” (tip of left ear removed under anesthesia) as this is the international mark of a neutered, vaccinated feral cat who is part of a colony or is being looked after. Several residents, primarily myself, are heavily involved in the trap-neuter-return (TNR) of these cats, and you will see many out there with eartips. If you see one in distress, or so friendly to people that you feel it should not be on the streets, eartipped or not, please contact me at Erica@catsinaction.org or find me on the Pullman Virtual Phone Tree Facebook group.

Pet cats and dogs can be booked in for free spay/neuter/vaccination/deworming packages at PAWS Chicago Lurie Clinic as part of their “Paws for Life Spay Day,” the last Friday of every month, by calling 773-640-5185. If this option isn’t convenient, call the main clinic number 773-521-7729 for a T, W, TH or SU appt. and your zip code will get you a \$10 cat spay with free distemper vaccination, and a dog spay/neuter with free Da2pp vaccine for only \$30 (extra charge for in-heat or dogs over 50lbs). The Da2pp vaccine prevents distemper/parvo virus and corona virus, all potentially fatal diseases in dogs. PAWS also runs a vaccination clinic (773-521-7729) where you can get updated vaccinations and tags, nail trims, ear cleanings and flea treatment, but all animals MUST be neutered prior to booking these services. PAWS will not vaccinate unneutered pets.

Spay/neuter prevents cats and dogs from breaking out of the house to mate and risking disease transmission, testicular cancer, mammary gland cancer, fatal uterine infections such as pyometra, and aggressive or nuisance behaviors. Spay Now or Pay Later!

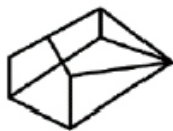
