Check the Mail: The 2020 Census Is on its Way

The 2020 Census is almost here! In mid-March households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the Census online, by phone or by mail. If our communities are undercounted, we will get fewer federal resources!

Census results are used to distribute more than \$675 billion in federal funds every year. If there's a major undercount, Illinois could lose up to \$1 billion in federal dollars. To put it another way, we will lose \$1,400 per person per year for every person not counted in the 2020 Census. That means funding cuts for Medicaid, student loans, food stamps, highways and more than 100 critical programs across the state.

As a reminder, there will be no citizenship question and the Census Bureau is legally bound to strict confidentiality; it cannot share your answers with anyone—not the IRS, not the FBI, not the CIA, not any government agency. Your individual information is secure. Your participation will impact federal investments in our community and your voice in Congress. For more information, please visit https://2020census.gov/.

A Resident's Guide to 9-1-1 Caller Anonymity

As a matter of policy, Chicago Office of Emergency Management and Communications 9-1-1 call-takers are required to ask callers reporting gang- and drug-related incidents whether they would like to remain anonymous.

In addition, any person reporting a crime – who is not a victim – may inform the call-taker that he/she wishes to remain anonymous.

- •If someone requests to remain anonymous, the 9-1-1 dispatcher and the officer receiving the call do not see the caller's name or address.
- •While residents who witness serious crimes have an obligation to come forward and cooperate with law enforcement authorities, it is the policy of the Chicago Police Department and the Office of Emergency Management and Communications to honor requests to remain anonymous whenever possible.

HOW TO REQUEST TO REMAIN ANONYMOUS:

- •Clearly state your request to remain anonymous to the 9-1-1 call-taker.
- •The call-taker will note this on the event record, which will make your information unavailable to a police dispatcher. The dispatcher will not have the caller information to pass along to police field personnel assigned to investigate the incident.
- •If you call 9-1-1 again with additional information, you must request to remain anonymous again, as another call-taker may take your call.

Do not mistake basic police investigative techniques as ignoring your wish to remain anonymous. Police officers have a duty and an obligation to canvass crime scenes for potential witnesses. Without knowing you called and requested to remain anonymous, police may knock on doors in the surrounding area attempting to locate potential witnesses, including yours.

Spring heralds the warm weather, lengthening days, the return of green to the landscape and lots of exciting restoration projects in Pullman. Work will recommence on the National Monument visitors center, finishing touches will occur on the Artspace project. In addition many of us will continue to act as good stewards to our historic houses and invest money and sweat equity in restoration projects large and small.

The Beman Committee is privileged to get a preview of some of the projects homeowners plan when they apply for the Façade Reimbursement Program in February. This year we had 12 projects submitted. The end result of these projects will be meaningful historically accurate restorations which will improve the entire neighborhood. On Forrestville the homeowners plan to completely restore the key bay front feature of their house, which will involve removing asphalt shingles, restore window openings to the original size and installing all new replica windows. The end result will be to match the award-winning restoration of the neighboring bay feature. Another homeowner plans on stripping paint from their brick façade and repointing the bricks. A number of other projects will see non-original windows removed and replaced with historically accurate replicas.

2020 Façade Reimbursement will also be the first year homeowners who have put their houses on the House Tour will have their projects automatically funded, we have several such projects. Come to the PCO General Meeting in March to see a preview of these projects and watch the spine tingling lottery as we pull the balance of the projects for funding. In all we have \$5,500 in funds from House Tour to award.

Bamboo, A Sometimes Taboo Plant: Green Spaces and Places Lynn Smith

There is a reason that gardeners are wary of bamboo. It has a reputation for steadily taking over gardens. Indeed, many non – clumping, "running "bamboos should be avoided. They have value however as an accent plant and as a plant which can help define boundaries/give privacy.

One variety of bamboo, called "Fagesia" (of which there are several varieties, among them nitida, growing up to eight feet, F. robusta, Pingwu, "green screen", growing to ten feet, and F. Demudata, growing to 10-15 feet), that could be considered. These bamboos are native to the forests of China where they evolved on the sides of mountains, interspersed with rhododendron and hydrangea, along with mahonia.

So, while exercising caution with bamboos is always a good idea, there are some varieties of bamboo that are winter hardy in Pullman and could be considered for an accent plant or screening – provided that you recognize that even clumping bamboo will need to be cut back. Also these plants can grow relatively quickly and need to be kept watered well. They will grow in sun to part shade. Like grasses they are normally cut back in late winter. And we'll keep talking....

Chicago's Irish-Americans and "Irish for the Day"-Americans celebrate St. Patrick's Day with the traditional green beer, Guinness, Irish coffee, Jameson, and, hopefully, a stomach full o' some good ol' corned beef and cabbage to sop up the "juices" that are to follow.

2020 has St. Paddy's Day and the presidential primary falling on the same day this year in our town so what to do? What to do? And in which order? Well, that's why I, Patty O'Wise One, am here. (How many thought I was going to say Patty O'Furniture? Amiright?)

First, prepare this gloriously easy crockpot recipe, VOTE in the primary elections, and then, and only then, get your green on and enjoy the day in the way your heart leads ye!

Corned Beef and Cabbage

Adjust all portions to the size of your slow cooker. I based this recipe on a 6-quart crock-pot.

12 Small red potatoes, quartered

4 Carrots, chopped or 10 baby carrots, halved

Corned beef brisket

2 Onions, sliced

3-4 Bay leaves

1 Head cabbage, wedged


Line your crock-pot with a slow cooker liner, if ya got. Place potatoes and carrots on the bottom of the slow cooker. Add corned beef, onions, bay leaves, and enough water to cover. Cover and cook on Low for 8-10 hours, or High for 4-5 hours. Add cabbage wedges halfway through cooking.

TIP OF THE MONTH

Easter egg dying time will be here before you know it and the best eggs to use for hard-boiling are 1-2 weeks old – fresh eggs do not peel easily. Pierce eggs with a needle prior to boiling to prevent cracks and place eggs in cold water first, then bring to a boil.


