As all in Pullman are aware, we're an unusual community that has accomplished quite a bit with limited resources. Many of these accomplishments have been driven by passionate community members volunteering their time and expertise to keep Pullman moving in a positive direction. Indeed, none of us would live in this community if not for the group of neighbors who came together to form the Civic Organization and literally save South Pullman from the wrecking ball. You wouldn't be reading this monthly paper if not for the folks who volunteer to create the content, edit the content, do the layout, and ultimately drop it in your mailbox each month.

The Beman Committee is no exception we run on the energy of our volunteers and as such we regularly work to cultivate community members to join our meetings and get lucky to find individuals who are passionate about preservation and/or have expertise in the areas of preservation. When possible, we invite these folks to step in and run the committee as co-chairs. A practice which helps renew the committee and can refocus its mission. Over the years we have had writers, marketers, architects, restoration contractors, among the many step up and co-chair the committee. All shared a passion for Pullman and what it represents, all informed the direction of the committee.

With this in mind I am happy to announce we will be transitioning co-chairs in June. Ann and John will be stepping aside to make room for two new co-chairs. One you know well – Wyatt Ollestad who will transition from PCO President back to Beman co-chair. Joining Wyatt to run the committee will be Megan Lydon.

Megan is a historic preservationist who lives and works in Pullman where she raises her two kids, Harvey and Mara. With the goal of making preservation accessible to all, Megan helps Pullman residents and investors navigate preservation tax incentives while consulting on best practices for rehabilitation and design. Megan is active in many Chicago and national preservation organizations and holds a Masters of Science in Historic Preservation from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Since moving to Pullman four years ago, Megan and her husband, John, have been lovingly restoring a row house on Forrestville and have enjoyed being involved with various groups throughout the community.

We welcome Megan and Wyatt as co-chairs and we're excited to see how they impact the work of the committee.

The next Beman Meeting is scheduled for Wednesday June 24th @ 7:30, we hope to hold the meeting in person (following all CDC guidelines). More details will follow.

Green Spaces and Places: Valuing Viburnums Lynn Smith

It's not difficult to write about Viburnums now. As I look out the window, the branches of the now 8 and half feet tall Korean Spice Viburnum are covered in probably over 200 flower buds. When I walk down St. Lawrence, I see another neighbor's Viburnum, which is possibly taller and even more luxuriantly blooming. So, we've established that this is a pretty and scent worthy shrub. What many people do not know is that this group of shrubs has great variety and toughness and is very adaptable to a range of soils and conditions.

Korean Spice Viburnums can grow from 4-10 feet in a rounded profile with stiff upward spreading branches. Light pink to reddish flower heads open white and offer up an All Spice/clove type fragrance. Leaves are red in the fall.

Other Viburnum, while not as fragrant, still offer interesting color in fall and very pretty berries. Among this type of Viburnum would be the Linden Viburnum ("Viburnum dilatatum"), the Nannyberry Viburnum ("Viburnum lentago") and the European Cranberrybush Viburnum ("Viburnum opulus"). The latter Viburnum has lacy white flowers and bright red fruit. Finally, the aristocrat of the Viburnums, and the one quite suitable for screening is Viburnum plicatum var tomentosum — or the Double File Viburnum. This one flowers well in shade and sun and can grow eight to ten feet. The latter shrub is good in zones 5-8 and native to China and Japan. And we'll keep talking...

From the Dining Car: Drink Tap Water for your Health and Wealth

I've always been a proponent of tap water over wasting money on the bottled variety and now Mary Hunt, author of one of my favorite daily online reads, "Everyday Cheapskate", backs me up in the following article:

It's difficult to pinpoint exactly when it happened, but sometime over the past decade or so, the general population of this country formed a belief that bottled water is better than tap water--safer and healthier, too. It is not difficult to figure out where this idea originated. It was with bottled water suppliers. It was pretty ingenious to convince otherwise normal people to pay between 240 and 10,000 times more to purchase water in a bottle than to get it from the supply we're already paying for that comes out of the taps in our homes.

TAP WATER IS CHEAPER

These days a 16-ounce bottle of "spring" water goes for about a dollar, which works out to about \$8.00 a gallon--twice the cost of milk, and about par with bottled soft drinks. Home delivery of water in those great big, heavy bottles is less per gallon but still around \$40 a month, according to online averages.

The average household cost for town water in the U.S. is \$.66 per cubic meter, which is 265 gallons, or 4,240 eight-ounce glasses of water--enough to last the average person 530 days (consuming eight 8-ounce glasses per day). Another way to price it: Sixty-two eight-ounce glasses of water cost about 1 cent.

TAP WATER IS SAFER

This may startle you, but it is absolutely true: Tap water is safer than bottled water. How could that be? The reason is simple. The water supply in the U.S. is regulated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under very strict guidelines and rules that are heavily enforced. Bottled water is subject to FDA rules, which are far less stringent. For example, tap water by law requires disinfection. Testing for bacteria must be conducted hundreds of times per month. Bottled water, on the other hand, is not required to be disinfected; the frequency of bacteria testing is fewer than 5 times each month.

TAP WATER IS HEALTHIER

Tooth decay in children is making a big comeback. The culprit? Bottled water. It's not the water that's causing the decay, according to the World Dental Congress. It's the lack of fluoride. Parents believe they are giving their children a superior product in bottled water, but in fact they are depriving kids of the fluoride and minerals they need to build healthy teeth and bodies. Fluoridation, present in most public water supplies, has become recognized as a key intervention in tooth decay.

So, the next time you feel thirsty, don't reach for a bottle. Instead turn on the tap. You'll be drinking water that is just as safe--or safer--than bottled water and saving money, too. Get the kids to switch and you just might head off big dental bills down the road as well.

Tip: Don't like the taste of your tap water? Invest in a filter pitcher or install an inexpensive faucet filter. (Reprinted in its entirety with permission by Creators Syndicate and Mary Hunt.)


