The PCO Vision Committee created a report last September that was a culmination of over sixteen months of meetings and discussions around feedback from over 150 community members. From this report, the PCO is committing to work toward achieving the following five goals:

- Goal One: Increase our diverse membership
- Goal Two: Clearly define our purpose and role in the community
- Goal Three: Extend our lines of communication with the community
- Goal Four: Make our community more inclusive
- Goal Five: Address issues that impact our quality-of-life

At the most recent PCO meeting, members approved our annual budget, which prioritized and aligned with these five goals. Funds have been designated to expand PCO sponsored special events; in addition to the upcoming Trunk-or-Treat, Veterans Day, Holiday Party, and Black History Month celebrations, we invite members to bring ideas to the Hospitality Committee that will further foster a sense of community. All ideas are welcome—from honoring LGBTQIA+ Pride and Hispanic Heritage Months to engaging in cook-off competitions and family nature walks. Have an event in mind? Our annual budget also allocated expanded funds to three PCO Committees. The Communication Committee will be researching email/SMS platforms that will better connect our organization with its members and the broader community. The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI) Committee will be hosting a facilitator to lead a series of sessions and community discussions on how we can collectively move toward equity and justice. The Beman Committee will lead hands-on workshops around best practices in historic preservation and how to navigate resources related to our Historic District. All of these initiatives align to our goals and are led by members who serve our community through their committee work.

Congratulations

The Pullman National Monument and State Historic Site Project has been awarded a 2022 Landmarks Illinois Richard H. Driehaus Foundation Preservation Award for Rehabilitation! The program is in its 29th year of celebrating exceptional preservation efforts in Illinois, and has honored individuals, organizations, projects and programs whose work demonstrate a commitment to historic preservation. An in-person ceremony to honor the nine awardees will be held November 4th at the Chicago Cultural Center.

This award honors six organizations and federal agencies for their decades of leadership and advocacy work in Chicago’s Pullman community that led to the creation of the 12-acre Pullman National Monument & Historic Site and the \$35 million rehabilitation of the long-vacant Pullman Administration-Clock Tower Building (now the Pullman Visitor Center). Recipients of the award are: the National Park Service, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Chicago Neighborhood Initiatives, National Park Foundation, Positioning Pullman Project Team and Historic Pullman Foundation. Solon Says: A Report of the PCO Beman Committee

Did you know that the PCO Beman Committee has a program in which homeowners can receive reimbursements of up to \$1000 for the restoration of the facades of their historic homes?

That’s right, the PCO Beman Committee’s Façade Reimbursement Program, now in its 10th year(!), provides property owners with reimbursements of up to \$1000 matched dollar-for-dollar by the owner for restoration work to the façade of their historic home. Windows, doors, porches and mansard roofs are just some of the things for which homeowners can receive a reimbursement, so long as the proposed work contributes to the historic character of the neighborhood.

And how does one go about applying for one of these reimbursements, you ask? It’s easy – beginning November 1, Applications for the Program will be made available online and in-person beginning at that month’s PCO General Membership meeting. Proposed work must meet the Committee’s qualifications for historic preservation and restoration, and all necessary permits must be secured before the work is undertaken. And if the cost of a permit seems daunting, remember: by virtue of our living in a historic District, permit fees (for any work!) can be waived by the City. Contact the PCO Beman Committee for more information.


And did you know that the Façade Reimbursement Program is funded each year by the annual Pullman House Tour? That’s right, half of the net proceeds from each year’s Tour fund each yearly cycle of the Program, ensuring that the House Tour continues to benefit homeowners and the community as a whole. The amount of funding available each year for the Program is thus entirely dependent upon the success of the previous year’s House Tour – the more tickets are sold, the more money is available to fund the Program. So be sure to talk up and promote the House Tour each and every year, because without House Tour, there is no Façade Reimbursement Program!

So if you’re looking to finally get those windows replaced, that front door fixed up, or even just want to give your house a fresh coat of paint in Pullman colors in 2023, now’s the perfect time to start planning and take advantage of the PCO Beman Committee’s Façade Reimbursement Program, now having leveraged just shy of half a million dollars in private investment since its inception a decade ago. Be on the lookout for the Application and Guidelines in November!

Green Spaces and Places:
Bringing the Outdoors In

As we head are heading into the cooler months of Autumn and Winter, it can be useful to find more ways of bring the outdoors in, not through making our homes more habitable to squirrels and racoons (!), but through the use of precooled bulbs (or alternatively cooling them yourself in the frig, in a paper bag for about 8-12 weeks) in a tall vase, often weighted down with gravel to help the flowers stay upright as they develop flowers.

Simply put, a healthy bulb, firm, large and without soft spots, has all the nutrients needed to flower indoors, once put in water, with gravel, with pointed side of the bulb planted upwards. It does not need soil. What it does need is fairly good bright indirect light (south, west and east facing light tends to be the brightest, in respective levels of brightness).

If they are not precooled bulbs, they will need to be cooled in the frig for the following number of weeks, in paper bages: Daffodils – 12-15 weeks, crocus – 8-15 weeks, hyacinths – 12-15 weeks – You can also get already set for forcing paperwhites/ narcissi, grown in Israel, at many garden centers, which do not need to be refrigerated first.

So, consider the use of either pre cooled (ie. narcissus , paperwhites, sometimes hyacinths if advertised as precooled) bulbs or regular bulbs (which you will need to cool in a root cellar or a refrigerator for the requisite time) to brighten up the chillier months of the year...and we’ll keeping talking...

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From the Dining Car

Back in the early days of the pandemic, whether because grocery store aisles started looking apocalyptically bare or because many of us got anxious about our lack of traditional survival skills, everyone started baking. Even before it became news and packaged yeast disappeared like Lysol, half the country decided to brush up on their bread-making. I made a few reasonably successful attempts my own self. I even bought a lovely Pullman pan for that perfectly square loaf...which I’ve now used exactly twice.

The truth is, in the giant game of “fast, cheap, good—you get to pick two” that comprises most of the decisions in our lives, my cooking decisions ALWAYS include “fast.” And bread is, well, just not fast.

So, no matter how delicious my homemade bagels were (and honestly, not to brag, but they were GOOD! Not New York good, mind you, but maybe ... western New Jersey?) there are far too many steps and too much precise waiting for things to rise for me to want to make them very often. That’s the glory of Allison Kallo’s no knead bread recipe—the rise time can be varied without huge consequences, and you truly don’t need to knead the dough to make delicious, crusty bread! This bread is perfect with the goat cheese and tomato tapas recipe from last month... and both are wonderful for these fall evenings as the temps drop and you start to crave hearty, warming dishes.

Ingredients:

- Three cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon rapid rise yeast (Instant yeast. Not Active Dry yeast)
- 1 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon vinegar (white or apple - I use apple)
- 1 1/2 cups hot water

Possible Extras: Herbs, pepper, cheese, olives, onions (don’t add sugar/sugary things; it messes with the yeast and yields a different—icky—flavor)

Steps:

Make the Dough:

1. In a largish bowl, whisk flour, yeast and salt. (If you are adding pepper or dried herbs, add them now.)
2. Add hot water and vinegar and stir until well mixed.
3. Give it a Long Rise. Cover the bowl with plastic or a plate and leave it alone for at least 4 hours. The dough should be stringy and airy.
4. Place your Dutch oven in the oven on a low rack. Turn on oven to 450. The pot should be in the oven for at least 20-30 min heating.
5. Give the Dough a Short Rise (while the pan and oven are preheating). Place some parchment paper on the counter, spray some olive oil or Pam or butter the parchment paper. Then scrape the dough from the bowl onto the parchment paper. (It should have bubbles on the surface, feel sticky, and look kinda stringy.)
6. If you are adding extras, toss them on the weird dough mass on the parchment paper. Pick up the ends of the dough and fold them toward the middle, covering any cheese that you tossed on (or they will bust through the dough when cooking and burn on the bottom of the bread). Leave it alone for about 20-30 min, while the pan preheats.
7. Put the Dough in the Hot Pan in the Hot Oven. This is the tricky part - Basically you have to get the dough into the hot Dutch oven. I use two methods:
 1. Parchment Paper Method: Cut the parchment paper around the dough. Pick up the dough by the bottom parchment paper and toss it in the Dutch oven without burning yourself. It is totally ok to throw the dough. This is preferred and, I think, much safer. The parchment paper may discolor, but it is ok.
 2. No parchment paper: Fold the dough back on itself and make it into as much of a ball as possible. Toss it into the Dutch oven. If possible, toss it in seam side up. But none of that actually matters.
8. Put the lid on and place the Dutch oven back in the oven. Bake 25 to 30 min.
9. Take the lid off and bake for 15-20.
10. Cool for 10 -15 min. Enjoy!

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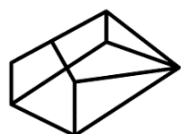
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
