#### Solon Says: A Report of the PCO Beman Committee

#### \*\*\*Permit Workshop to be held March 4 from 1-3pm\*\*\*

Come one, come all – the Beman Committee will be hosting a building permit workshop on Saturday, March 4th from 1-3pm at the Florence Lowden Miller Historic Pullman Center (614 E. 113th Street).

Applying for a building permit is never easy. But, the Beman Committee is here to help! Join us for an informational working session. Show up at any time to chat with committee co-chairs, Megan Lydon and Wyatt Ollestad, about the permit process, Landmarks requirements, or the permit fee waiver program. And if you're actively looking to apply for a permit or the fee waiver, feel free to bring a laptop and your project's information (including contractor info) and we'll help walk you through the process live & in-person!

Wondering why you need a building permit or what the permit fee waiver is? Take a look below for some quick facts:

Building Permits: Ensuring that any proposed work meets with the requirements of the Chicago Building Code is important to preserve the structural integrity of buildings and safety for its occupants. Moreover, much of Pullman's noteworthiness is because of its architecture, so making sure no improper work is done to the facades of buildings is equally important.

*Permit Fee Waiver:* One of the perks of living in a Chicago Landmark District is the opportunity to waive all City Permit fees. This includes permits for all work being done to buildings within our district – both interior and exterior, including work to the rear of a property such as new garage construction, fences, etc.

Landmark District: The Commission on Chicago Landmarks is part of the Department of Buildings, and oversees the preservation, maintenance, and rehabilitation of Chicago's historic buildings. The southern part of Pullman was declared a City Landmark District in 1972, the northern part in 1993, and then both were merged into one in 1999. Unlike many other Landmark properties in the City, the entirety of Pullman constitutes a singular District, which means each and every building within the District falls under Landmarks purview.

Façade Regulations: Commission on Chicago Landmarks and the Beman Committee are really only concerned with the street-facing facades of buildings, as they connote the historic architectural significance of the neighborhood. Property owners are free to do with the inside of their buildings as they see fit — so long as any applicable work is permitted. The interior of Pullman buildings is guided by the Chicago Building Code, so any major structural, electrical, plumbing, etc. work needs to be permitted. Which is to say, the same standards apply to the interior of Pullman buildings as the interior of any other building in the city.

### Green Spaces and Places: Starting from Scratch - Seed Starting Basics

A seed could be considered a plant embryo in a protective seed coat. All the ingredients for success are within that capsule, it simply needs light, moisture, a good soil / germination mixture, and sometimes, depending on the plant, a period of chilling or what is called – scarification- when the seed needs to be nicked or sanded, to germinate properly. Some reasons to consider growing plants from seeds include reducing the cost of perennials and annuals, the simple enjoyment of it, ability to get a greater variety of plants than you might get otherwise, and getting a head start on the nurseries!

Seeds vary in terms of the time that they take to break the seed coat, i.e., germinate. With some seeds such as nasturtium you might see seeds germinating in ten days, while other seeds can take up to a month. They also vary in terms of their light needs- and though one can use a windowsill or ideally a south facing window for some plants needing more light (at least six hours of light), other, more shade tolerant plants such as mints, ivies, parsleys, etc., might grow well with four hours of sun.

Sturdy water holding containers of all types such as yoghurt containers, coffee cups, small clay pots, etc, can be used to put soil starting medium like sterilized soil, peat moss, etc., but these containers need to be clean and with good drainage. Clear plastic can be put in place over the pot with the soil and seed initially, to ensure there is proper moisture, but should be removed once the seed starts to sprout and you can continue to keep it moist. Most seeds that you start indoors will need a period of "hardening off" – toughening the plants up before they are ready to be transplanted into the garden. This normally entails putting the indoor acclimated seedling outside, to a shady area for several hours at a time, and then bringing them in / repeatedly, until the plant appears strong enough. Late February will still be early to actually begin seeds but certainly by late March or April one could begin the propagation process. Certainly now is a good time to begin perusing the seed catalogs, and there are a large variety of seeds at your disposal! So don't let the Winter doldrums grab a hold of you! You've got a world of seeds at your disposal! And we'll keep talking...

Hello Neighbors,



Fondue is love food—a rich and delicious meal that takes a long time to enjoy and that you eat from a communal pot. It's food you share only with the people who tell great stories and with whom you can laugh.

If you are lucky, you may already have a fondue pot (likely from the avocado and burnt orange era). If you are REALLY lucky, you may have the electric fondue pot that your parents got as a wedding present that you "borrowed" when you moved out and may or may not have returned. If you are not so lucky, electric fondue pots are readily available online (and are much less likely to burn down your house than mine is).

#### The Cheese Fondue

- 1 lb gruyere cheese, cut into cubes
- 1/2 lb Jarlsberg (or Emmentaler or another Swiss-style cheese), cut into cubes
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 1 ounce kirsch cherry brandy (optional but delicious)
- 1/4 tsp baking soda

Cut the garlic clove in half, rub the inside of your fondue pot and discard. Add the wine to your pot and heat on medium. Add the cheese and stir until the cheese begins to melt, add the kirsch and turn the heat to low, stirring until the cheese is fully melted. Just before serving, add the baking soda—it will froth up the fondue and help recombine any of the oil that has separated from the cheese.

Serve with a big bowl of crusty bread cubed into bite-sized pieces. If you are feeling guilty about the prospect of eating an enormous pot of cheese, throw some broccoli and cauliflower florets into the dipping mix. In the age of Covid, make it a house rule that the fondue fork gets to travel only from the pot to your plate and provide a separate fork from plate to mouth. Back in the savage days of yore, we ate the fondue straight from the fondue fork and then dipped it right back in with another hunk of bread... but we also didn't wear bike helmets or seat belts, so there may have been brain damage.

After eating the cheese fondue, carefully clean the pot. You do not want any remnants of the cheese (and especially any hint of the garlic) in your chocolate fondue. Take your time—everyone will want a bit of a breather before dessert.

#### The Chocolate Fondue


1 cup Ghiradelli milk chocolate chips (or any good chocolate—you can also use dark chocolate, I just prefer milk)

1 cup heavy cream

Heat the cream on medium and add the chips. Once you see the chips begin to melt, turn down the heat and stir until it is a thick, shiny, luscious ganache. Pretend the process is difficult and precise and make your friends chop up the dipping ingredients while you make the fondue.

You can dip almost anything you'd like in the chocolate fondue. Try not to add things that are too juicy and will dilute it. My standard go-tos are: Strawberries, bananas, mandarin orange slices (canned), mini marshmallows, and pound cake cut into cubes.

Everyone who thought they were way too full of bread and cheese to have any dessert will find that they miraculously have a little more room. It may be bleak and cold outside still, but you are here, warm and full of cheese and chocolate, surrounded by the people that you love




