

PCO GENERAL MEETING Wednesday, May 17, 7:30 pm

From the PCO President John Lydon

Last month's Flyer unpacked the article, "Rethinking Pullman: Urban Space and Working-Class Activism" by Dr. Janice L. Reiff. A central theme in her writing examined Pullman through conceived, perceived, and lived spaces that define community boundaries and how people move within them over time. This month, let's use the same framework to probe further into the history of our community's conceived boundaries.

From its inception in 1880, Pullman spaces were planned with an intentional cohesion of architecture by Solon Beman and integrated landscape by Nathan Barrett. Over 75 years later, the Chicago Plan Commission produced an interim report recommending the need to raze the community, allowing for a new industrial park to be built to attract additional industry and jobs. The report called for the "immediate passage of the proposed Chicago zoning ordinance which contains provisions for the rezoning from residential to industrial use of hundreds of acres of potential industrial land in and around Lake Calumet" in addition to citing "obsolete and substandard dwellings need replacement or rehabilitation by urban renewal programs" for the expansion and extension of "expressways and parking lots." The rendering below highlights the dire threat the plan presented to Pullman residents.

In 1960, the Pullman Civic Organization—originally a WWII Civil Defense Organization—was reinstituted to rally against the proposed demolition promoted by the South End Chamber of Commerce. After the PCO won the battle to preserve Pullman, decades of subsequent efforts and accolades arose. Pullman became recognized by the city, state, and nation for its significant historical contributions; these designations & dates are below.

1969 Pullman designated a State of Illinois Landmark
1969 Pullman added to the National Register of Historic Places
1971 Pullman designated a National Historic Landmark District
1972 Pullman south of 111th Street designated a Chicago Landmark District
1993 Pullman north of 111th Street designated a Chicago Landmark District
1999 Pullman Chicago Landmark Districts joined, forming the singular district
2015 Pullman designated a National Monument
2022 Pullman designated a National Historical Park

All of these designations establish defined, physical boundaries (i.e., conceived space). Today, all designations are bounded north and south by 104th and 115th. Every organization and institution of service to our community—the Historic Pullman Foundation, National Park Service, National A. Philip Randolph Pullman Porter Museum, Historic Pullman Empowerment Organization, Historic Pullman Garden Club, and Pullman Arts—have no restrictions regarding membership. The one exception is the PCO; the last vestige of separating conceived space in our community.

As we head into a new year of membership and officer terms, it is critical to consider how conceived boundaries impact perceived and lived spaces in Pullman. Talk with a neighbor. Discuss with someone new. Together, we can!

Solon Says: A Report of the PCO Beman Committee

In April, Keith Goad from Berkshire Hathaway Home Services joined us for a presentation about the importance of historic preservation at both the individual and community level, and how proper restoration contributes not only to the stability of individual buildings but also the neighborhood as a whole. Historic districts are by their very nature sustainable, and as property owners each and every effort we make towards maintaining Pullman's historic character helps to stably increase property values both for ourselves and for our community.

And then in early May, graduate students from the School of the Art Institute presented their ideas for adaptive reuse of Market Hall as part of their classwork under instructor Charlie Pipal, detailing their research and offering two distinct ideas for potential reuse of the building. And be on the lookout for even more great programming coming from the Beman Committee this year: in June, we'll be hosting a hands-on masonry workshop led by restoration consultant and stonemason Simon Leverett, in which he'll explain the importance of proper mortar usage on historic buildings and teach the proper methods for repointing – a skill which every homeowner (especially of historic buildings) should know! 
Green Spaces and Places: The Remarkable Redbud Tree

I recently returned from several days of hiking at Starved Rock State Park, which is about two hours west of here. The Redbuds , otherwise known as "Cercis canadensis" were spectacular, with their purplish pink pea shaped blossoms blooming prior to the leaves, so amazingly colored that by comparison the crabapples trees, while pretty, just looked peevishly pastel. Better yet, Red buds are native to our area, and can grow in light shade to sun. Like the Amelanchier, or Shadberry, Redbud are understory trees, which makes them ideally suited to city environments where part sun is more common than a full sun exposure.

This deciduous tree grows to 25 feet tall with heart shaped leaves – and flowers which are edible and can be eaten raw in salads (I personally prefer them on the tree, but there's no accounting for tastes). The tree is a nitrogen fixer, meaning that it's growth improves the soil, and invaluable to birds, bees, and butterflies.

This tree will need good watering in the first year or two to become established, but when mature can tolerate drought. An interesting purple leaved cultivar is named "Forest Pansy". There are few Spring trees that have such striking blossom colors, and we'll keep talking...

From the Dining Car

Well, Chicago is being Chicago again... as I write this, it's cold and gray and rainy, but by the time you read it, it could just as easily be 85 and sunny. Not that a bowl full of warm, spicy dal isn't welcome when it's hot outside, but today, particularly, I keep thinking about how satisfying and warming this sounds.

Today's recipe comes from Arlene Echols, who described this dish to me a couple of weeks ago and said it is her go-to lunch that she never tires of eating... which has made me think of it every cold Chicago spring day since then! It's a modified Pakistani recipe that former Pullmanite Tazeen Swinea's mother taught to her and that she taught to Arlene. Arlene says "Leave out the crushed red pepper, or add more, depending on your affinity for a taste that bites. As you can see, it's vegan, but add meat or other veggies if you like. This dish freezes exceptionally well."

Masoor Dal

3 cups water

½ lb red lentils

3 cloves

3 whole peppercorns (<1/a>% t ground pepper)

1 t salt

2 tsp turmeric

3 tsp whole cumin

1 T minced garlic

1 T minced ginger

½ t crushed red pepper

¼ to ⅓ c cooking oil


1¼ cup chopped onion

Fresh chiles (if desired)

1 bunch cilantro (if desired)

Rinse the lentils. Bring lentils, cloves, peppercorns, salt, and 1 tsp turmeric to boil. Skim off the foam. Grind 1 tsp cumin between palms into dal. Add ginger and garlic. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp crushed red pepper. Cook on low heat for about 40 minutes.

In a separate pan, bring oil to a simmering heat. Add 2 tsp cumin. After 1-2 minutes, when cumin is mostly risen to the top, add onion. Fry onion on medium heat for about 10 minutes until it begins to brown. Add ¼ tsp crushed red pepper. Turn off onions. Add 1 tsp turmeric. Combine the dal (lentils) and the onion. Serve over rice with fresh chiles and cilantro on the side.


