Since 1960, the PCO gathers, supports, and informs our community. This month, we welcome back the Cook County Clerk's Office to ensure neighbors are able to properly protect their assets for their families and loved ones. While it may be difficult to discuss end-of-life planning, it is a critical measure as the threat of property fraud continues to be an increasing financial crime across the country. We are grateful for Cook County Clerk Karen Yarbrough and her team's tireless efforts to inform residents about the best means to proactively plan.

Did you know federal data collected from 2020 to 2021 highlighted an increase in real estate scams by 64%, totalling over \$350 million in lost assets? Identification verification is a weak point in real estate transactions that can open the door to fraud. Property fraud is defined as the illegal recording of a document against your home's property records. Property fraud can involve the recording or filing of false or forged transfers of ownership, quick claim deeds, or the filing of a bogus lien to steal property or harass an unsuspecting property owner. Even if your home is paid off, that does not stop someone from filing a new deed on top of it without the property owner's knowledge. As Karen Yarbrough noted, "It's easier to steal a home in Illinois than it is a car."

What can you do? At the upcoming Property After Death Forum, you will learn about the Property Fraud Alert Program in addition to critical forms including the Transfer on Death Instrument, Payable on Death Instrument, and the Secretary of State Beneficiary Affidavit Form. While the Cook County Clerk's Office does not provide legal advice, there will be volunteer attorneys available at the forum to meet with individuals to discuss the best next steps in planning.

The following are telltale signs of property fraud:

Individuals have stopped receiving water or utility bills as well as property tax assessments

Vacant property utility bills suddenly rise or unknown people inhabit a property

Tenants' rent payments stop or are being directed to another entity Payment books or other information is received from lenders with whom you have not done business

Homeowners find themselves in default on a loan or notified of foreclosure proceedings

Please also note the Cook County Clerk's Office can provide essential documentation (e.g., home deeds) at a fraction of the cost of companies offering identical services that charge exorbitant fees. Join us on October 28th to learn more.

Well, another House Tour is now in the rear-view mirror, and it was a milestone one! This year House Tour turned the big 5-0, and it's been thanks to the countless hours volunteered each and every year that has allowed it to continue decade after decade. That House Tour has lasted so long is a testament to just how much the residents of Pullman take pride in their community. Many thanks to all who offered their homes, participated in events, and volunteered their time. As a reminder and for those who don't know, half the net proceeds from House Tour fund the Beman Committee's Façade Reimbursement Program each year, so House Tour is very important to the Beman Committee!

Speaking of the Façade Reimbursement Program, we have our own special anniversary to announce: 2024 marks the 20th year of the Façade Reimbursement Program, started back in 2004 as a way to encourage property owners to restore the facades of their homes by offering matching reimbursements for qualifying work. In the 20 years of the Program, reimbursements totaling \$120,000 have been issued to property owners, leveraging \$541,358 in private investment. Let us repeat that: over half a million dollars has been invested by property owners in Pullman toward restoring the facades of our historic homes. These aren't businesses or developers – these are your neighbors, once again showing just how important Pullman is to its residents.


We're working on some ideas to make the 20th year of the Façade Reimbursement Program truly special, and as always be sure to watch this space, check out our Facebook group, or attend a PCO General Membership meeting for the latest and greatest. Applications and Guidelines for next year's cycle will once again be made available starting in November and due back by December 31, with projects to then be completed in 2024. So gather up those contractor quotes, write out your list of questions for us on how to get a permit, print that drawing from the Façade Legacy Project website (pullman-museum. org/facades) and let's celebrate the 20th anniversary in style!

Green Spaces and Places: The American Cranberry Bush Lynn Smith

As Fall continues to deepen, we look for plants that display the changing of the seasons with their showy colors and possibly berries. One of the more attractive native bushes with these characteristics is the American Cranberry Bush, or Viburnum Opulus var. Americanum.

This shrub, growing up to twelve feet high and 8-12 feet wide, grows well in sunny to partially shaded spots, with good drainage. It will produce lacecap white flowers in Spring that then develop into bright red, drooping fruits (which are edible to humans and birds and high in vitamin C, though having a large seed). It is well liked by birds and butterflies, and turns red, yellow and purple in Fall.

Native Americans used this bush for both food and medicinal purposes. It was consumed during the winter months due to its high vitamin C content. In one article it notes that though the berries are edible and tasty they should be eaten in small quantities. One article mentions that the fruits are best eaten when picked just after the first frost. And we'll keep talking....

From the Dining Car **Astrid Fingerhut**

It's October—how did it get to be October so quickly?! Time has been playing tricks again. I've been finding myself walking around and muttering "There will be time... there will be time.... Time for you and time for me, and time yet for a hundred indecisions, and for a hundred visions and revisions before the taking of a toast and tea." The fall, with its shorter days and cooler temperatures is always a bit hard and even years where I don't feel constantly stressed for time, time in the form of daylight is slipping away. My mother reminds me every year of the Scandinavian concept of "hygge," which is basically creating an atmosphere of warmth, coziness, comfort, and contentment in your home that brings the focus inward during the dark, cold months.


So, this month I'm planning to make more soups and stews—rich, nourishing foods that fill the house with warmth and the scent of delicious things cooking. But, since hygge can only work if you aren't annoyed with having to cook all day, I'm planning to make things as easy as I possibly can too. I'm sure there are more delicious recipes for broccoli soup... but this one is easy and satisfying. May we all be surrounded with warmth and comfort and may the season be filled with family and friends and lots of hygge!

Broccoli soup

- A tablespoon or two of any high heat oil—I usually use avocado
- Two medium sized crowns of broccoli, cut into small florets and the stems cut a bit smaller
- A medium sized shallot (optional—shallots add flavor, but for the allium-averse, you totally don't need them)
- One medium to large potato skinned and cubed into small pieces
- One 32 oz container chicken broth (or veggie broth)
- 1/2 -1 cup whipping cream (or, you know, as much as you want....)
- Shredded cheddar cheese to taste—I like to taste a LOT of cheese
- Croutons or goldfish crackers

Heat the oil in a large pan or dutch oven to medium. Toss in the broccoli and cook until you start to get some caramelization. If you are cooking with shallots, you can add them a couple of minutes into the cook so they don't burn. Add your cubed potato and broth and let simmer for several minutes. Once the potato is cooked (soft when you poke it with a fork), you can either blend with an emersion blender or a food processer (or, if you have a reasonably powerful blender and no food processor, toss it in the blender) until it's smooth. The potato will thicken the soup. Return the soup to the pot and add cream until it's thinned a bit, the color is what you'd like, or you start to worry about your arteries. You can also add cheese to the main pot, but I tend to add enough cream that I like to fool myself into thinking I'm still being healthy by adding the cheese to my individual bowl instead. Add croutons or goldfish crackers and enjoy!

You can totally make your own broth and your own croutons, which will make this soup fancier... but honestly, it's pretty good even with Swanson's and Goldfish crackers.


