PCO ANNUAL HOLIDAY PARTY Wednesday, December 20, 7:30 pm

From the PCO President John Lydon

Happy holidays and season's greetings to the Pullman community. For decades, the Pullman Flyer published a series of December articles by Mario Avignone, a founding member of the Pullman Civic Organization, where he reflected on historic holiday celebrations in our community. In Mario's 1979 article, he recounted the very first holiday celebration sponsored by the PCO; this article is included below.

The first Christmas celebration by the PCO was on Sunday, December 17, 1960 with a Childrens' Christmas party. Santa arrived in Pullman on a sleigh and went up and down every street inviting all the children to come to Market Hall for a Christmas Party. At Market Hall, Santa treated the children to candy and cracker jacks. Parents were given a free cup of coffee. About 150 children up to 11 years old attended the party.

The PCO also sponsored a Christmas outdoor "house decorations contest" and the judging took place on December 27th, 28th, and 29th by a committee headed by Jerry Tourville. Quite a number of residents decorated the outside of their homes giving the judges a difficult time in picking a winner. Winners, however, were finally chosen. They were: 1st place - Domenic Boesso (11344 Forrestville), 2nd place - Fred Minster and Lloyd West (11257 St. Lawrence), and 3rd place - Alphonse Sanchez (11400 St. Lawrence).

A group of PCO members went Christmas caroling around Pullman on Christmas Eve, December 24th from 6:30 to 8:30pm. Jerry Tourville was in charge of carolers. It was a cold evening with snow on the ground making it difficult and uncomfortable for the carolers to sing. We stopped at various homes and sang in front of the house. The people came out to listen and in some cases, brought out some "spirits" to drink to keep us warm. The exhausted unprofessional group of men and women calling themselves carolers ended up at Market Hall where refreshments were served.

The general meeting of the PCO was held on Wednesday evening, December 21st at 8:00pm in the American Legion Hall. A good size crowd was in attendance. President Lisciotto congratulated Mr. & Mrs. Bill Sheahan on the birth of a daughter and Mr. & Mrs. Charles Esterhammer on a baby son. After the business portion of the meeting, we had community singing of Christmas Carols. Door prizes consisting of turkey, fruit cake, and tickets to the first PCO Pullman Homecoming Dance were given away. The evening ended with the serving of refreshments by the hostess committee.

Christmas 1960 is long gone. Many of the residents have long passed on or moved out of the community to all parts of the country. The children who received candy from Santa Claus at Market Hall have since grown up and many have children of their own. We who are still here are thankful for all the blessings Pullman have received the past 19 years and wonder what the future holds.

Merry Christmas to all.

Since 1960, the PCO gathers, supports, and informs our community. Thank you to all who continue to work toward making our collective better as we welcome the new year.



Green Spaces and Places: Christmas Tree Origins Lynn Smith

Regardless of your beliefs or religion, there is something fascinating about the longevity and popularity of the use of evergreens, and later, "The Christmas Tree". As I have noted in other holiday columns , there has been a long history, going back to pre-Christian times – of evergreens being used to symbolize, variously, victory, fidelity, the existence of life over death, light in the midst of darkness, etc. The Romans used evergreens, as did the English, German, possibly Latvians and Estonians. In recent times, most scholars believe that the use of the Christmas tree as we know it originated in the Alsace region (now part of France it was in the 16th century when this tradition seems to have begun- in Germany). Records indicate that a Christmas Tree was raised in the Strasbourg Cathedral in 1539.

More recently, (that term being relative) Queen Victoria and her husband Prince Albert (yes the same couple that gave their name to the museum in London) popularized the use of the Christmas tree in 1848 – when illustrations of their family around a Christmas tree was published in "The Illustrated London".

Regardless of how this tradition originated, and your belief system, there is something invigorating and restorative in using lights and greenery in this time closest to the Winter Solstice, the day of the least daylight in the year. So, here's wishing you the happiest holiday season, with friends and family, and traditions that bring people together, to bring comfort, good cheer and resilience for the coming year! Pullman House Project Pat Shymanski

On November 2, 2023, the Chicago Landmarks Commission presented an Award of Excellence to Michael and Patricia Shymanski for the restoration and rehabilitation on 605 East 111th Street. The house was originally built as One Florence Blvd. as the home for the Plant Manager (1881 to 1900), and then for a half century was occupied by the Pullman Club, followed by a series of restaurants including Sessions, The Retreat and Mercs.

One Florence Blvd. has been rededicated as the Welcome Center for the Pullman House Project, an interpretive tour program of the Bielenberg Historic Pullman House Foundation, and also includes the Pullman Club Coffee Shop. The Coffee Shop (773-397-3022) is open daily 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. (closed on Mondays). Local businesses involved in the construction and restoration at One Florence Blvd. were General Contractor Raffin Construction with finished trim and fine woodwork by local craftsman, Tim Peloquin.

The Pullman House Project conducts a year-round ticketed tour program which starts from this beautifully renovated building where visitors are welcomed to join the only regular tours of Pullman which include the recreated interiors of select original Pullman homes. Pullman House Project guides tell the stories of several Pullman families in the places they called home. Tour tickets are available at www.pullmanathome.org .Even if you're not ready for a tour, you're invited to stop for an exceptional beverage at the Pullman Club Coffee Shop located in what was once Pullman's largest single-family home.

The Pullman House Project and the Pullman Club Coffee Shop are programs of the Bielenberg Historic Pullman House Foundation, a 501 c3 not-for-profit organization, and an interpretive/programmatic partner organization to the National Park Service — Pullman National Historical Park.

From the Dining Car **Astrid Fingerhut**

Well, the season of darkness is upon us and my mother has started her annual reminder of the joys of hygge and the importance of embracing warm, cozy, home activities and lots of rest. All I really want is to eat gummy bears until daylight savings time kicks back in, but we've still got a whole lot of darkness and cold to get through before that happens.

So, in honor of hygge and all my Norwegian family who manage to survive much darker winters than we get here, I present the national dish of Norway, the most comforting of comfort food... fårikål.

Fårikål is lamb stew—easy to make, rich, and nourishing. If you happen to have an instant pot, set the cooking timer for 20 minutes and do that scary depressurizing thing right away and you'll have a pot of deliciousness. If you don't, you'll just have to cook it in a large pot until the potatoes at the top are cooked through—everything else should be done by then.

Fårikål—Lamb and Cabbage stew

About 2 lbs of lamb—Aldi has some lovely boneless lamb loin roasts that I've been using. Usually I've used shoulder cuts, which means you end up having to cut around a lot of bones. Cooking the bones adds to the flavor, but not enough to justify the annoyance. Cut into large bite sized pieces. You do want some fat on the meat—if you use a loin which is lean meat surrounded by a thick layer of fat, slice the fat off the outside and use it to layer in the cabbage.

One medium-sized cabbage, washed and cut into half-inch slices.

4-5 potatoes, peeled and cut into quarters.

Carrots—you're really supposed to peel and cut real carrots, but I always just dump in some baby carrots as I'm not a cooked carrot fan and I usually find a way to feed them to my dog.

Salt and pepper, whole peppercorns, a high temp oil (such as avocado)

Line the bottom of your pot (or Instant Pot) with the lamb and add some oil to prevent it from sticking. Add salt and pepper and some peppercorns each layer. If you have that layer of fat that you cut off the lamb, add that as a layer in between the layers of cabbage. Next add the potatoes and carrots. I think you're actually supposed to add some water, but the cabbage will release enough water to cook the potatoes and will make a delicious broth with the lamb. If you are cooking it on the stove, cover it and maybe add a little water. Cook for 20 minutes in the instant pot or until the potatoes are done and the cabbage is cooked soft but not falling apart.
